Decoding the acronyms: What is...?

- NSF: The National Science Foundation (NSF) is an independent federal agency created by Congress in 1950 "to promote the progress of science; to advance the national health, prosperity, and welfare; to secure the national defense..." NSF is vital because it supports basic research and people to create knowledge that transforms the future.
- NSF INCLUDES Initiative: NSF INCLUDES (Inclusion Across the Nation of Communities of Learners of Underrepresented Discoverers in Engineering and Science) is a comprehensive national initiative to enhance U.S. leadership in discoveries and innovations by focusing on diversity, inclusion and broadening participation in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) at scale. - Click "Register" to sign up and join National Network. Enter your name and email address and click "submit."
- You will receive an email within 1 business day confirming that your account has been approved.
- After receiving the confirmation email, click <u>LOGIN/REGISTER</u> and click "<u>confirm your email</u>" located under "Already registered and need to create a password?"
- Enter your email and click "Send Password Link."
- You will receive an email from <u>Mail@connectedcommunity.org</u> titled "Forgotten password on <u>www.includesnetwork.org</u>."
- Follow the embedded link to create your password and activate your account. Check your spam or with your IT department if you do not receive an email!
